What Is the Asian Games?



Asian Games and Its History

The Asian Games, a quadrennial sporting event, is the largest sports celebration in Asia. Organized by the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA), the event draws athletes from 45 countries and regions in Asia. The first games took place in 1951, shortly after the end of the Second World War, in New Delhi, and athletes from 11 countries, including Japan, participated.

The meet embodied the hope that Asian countries, with their ties torn apart by the war, would be reunited through sports to contribute to establishing a permanent peace in Asia.

Since then, the Asian Games has served as a great event to contribute to international peace by providing opportunities to foster friendship and respect diversity through sports.





Characteristics of the Games

The Asian Games is characterized by its extensive range of sports to be contested at the event, which include not only those contested at the Olympic Games, but also kabaddi, sepak takraw, and other sports popular in Asia.









Games Emblem



Emblem Objectives

The smooth curves describe the liveliness of sports. The center line colored in purple, gold and green inspires the image that people get together as one and go forward to the future by heading to a bright red sun, the symbol of the OCA. The purple represents the iris, which is the prefectural flower of Aichi. The gold describes the Kinshachi, the golden tiger-fish roof ornaments and the symbol of Nagoya Castle. And the green is inspired by the high environmental consciousness of the people of Aichi-Nagoya fostered through EXPO Aichi 2005, COP10 and the UNESCO World Conference on ESD.

The emblem contains the initial letters of Asia, Aichi, and Nagoya. You can see "A" indicated by the purple curve and the center line and "N" in the purple and gold.

Slogan Objectives

The organizers claim that sports have the power to bring people together beyond the barriers of language, culture, and nationality.

They hope that the Aichi-Nagoya 2026 Asian Games will be an opportunity for every person in society today, which is increasingly diversifying, to be able to imagine their own 'ONE ASIA' with the power of sports so that the ties among the people of Asia will be strengthened and enable them to look forward to a bright future.

Renovation of the Nagoya City Mizuho Park Athletic Stadium

With the design phase launched in FY2021, the stadium is planned to be opened in FY2026.

Point

Nagoya City will develop the athletic stadium into a facility suitable not only as the main part of Mizuho Park, but also as a venue for the Asian Games Aichi-Nagoya 2026. The city will strive to ensure that the renovated stadium will continue to attract many future users even after the end of the Games and serve as the hub for promoting sports in Nagoya.

Initiative Overview

Nagoya City will renovate the Nagoya City Mizuho Park Athletic Stadium (Mizuho Ward, Nagoya City) toward ensuring that the stadium is acknowledged as the hub for promoting sports based on the legacy of the Aichi-Nagoya 2026 Asian Games.

Establishment of the New Aichi Prefectural Gymnasium in the North Area of Meijo Park

Point

Aichi Prefecture will establish the New Aichi Prefectural Gymnasium as a facility that will inherit the accumulated tradition of the current gymnasium and serve as a symbol of Aichi-Nagoya.

Initiative Overview


